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## A Word from one of our Ministers

Friends.

May already! This year is moving on so quickly, and the life of our church family at Cornerstone brings a constantly changing diet of challenge and joy, sadness and laughter as we learn to live more closely together in a more deeply connected family of faith. Testimonies shared in the Gratitude moments have brought tears to eyes, conversations over meals together have recalled shared experiences, and Gavin's sitting down looms in the not-so-distant future, (do you have the date of his leaving service in your diary? Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> July at 2.30pm!) but we have the arrival of Tony and Mandy to which to look forward. Times change and we learn to adapt.

Cornerstone is adapting and changing too — we have had Charlotte Betts here from the Connexional Property Team to meet with some of the Leadership Team and to explore what a redevelopment of London Road might involve and indeed, might look like. What has become clear as part of her visit is that we need to be clear about what the mission of the church requires of the building: she is very clear that permissions for property development hinge on mission. She has recommended a comprehensive community consultation as well as giving us some new ideas to consider — we are so pleased that she made the journey all the way from Exeter in early April to meet with us! Please watch this space for ways that YOU can contribute to the community consultation, and to the next steps.

Cornerstone has much to celebrate though — and I can reflect on the way that you are engaging in conversations about faith: we have had a series of Monday evening meals at the St Andrews chapel to complement the Sunshine and Showers course which ran during Lent. Not only did a group regularly meet to eat together and share faith conversations, but up to 18 people met each Monday to explore the paradoxical nature of prayer. We had a great Church Film Night in April, the first one, when we watched the challenging film, The Shack, and then discussed it over a meal together. Fifteen brave souls joined in that conversation, and we are looking

forward to the next Church Film Night in July. Developing our confidence in engaging in faith talk is significant and I am so proud that so many have recently begun to do just that – please keep going and inspire others! This continues to be a fundamental part of our witness.

This leads to the next amazing opportunity: the year of celebration that we are looking to plan for 2026, when we can acknowledge 250 years of Methodist witness in the Horsham area. What a joy! This is an excellent chance to engage with the locality as we share the distinctive gifts that Methodism brings to the ecumenical party – what makes us different, what we do in particular ways, and what we offer to the wider community. Celebrating this milestone gives us a reason to engage with everyone in that community so that we can make sure that by the end of 2026, everyone in the Horsham District has heard about Methodism and knows what makes us tick.....how can you contribute to that? Ideas are already flying – do get in touch if you have thoughts about that! I will be looking to develop a "250<sup>th</sup> working group" in the early summertime, so that we can begin to draw together a diary of the year and strategically look at the opportunities available to us. Could you join?

Finally, I am excited about our annual away-day this year at Trinity in Storrington. We will be exploring "Solidarity through Diversity" with a guest speaker, Deacon Ruth Yorke, who is an ambassador for the Inclusive Church Network. Make sure that you have Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> June in your diary – it will be an interesting and inspiring day, we hope.

## **Elyane Dale**

I will start by asking myself this question: Does the language I use to address God in my prayers alter my idea of God?

"Seigneur" "Notre Père" "Mon Dieu": My parents taught me to love God as a Father who loves us and looks after us. My human father was doing all those things so it was easy to grasp. Their engagements in the life of our Catholic Church in Lyon and their strong faith were so encouraging. My first communion at the age of seven followed by the more solemn ceremony at the age of twelve were normal and expected events in my life. I remember the preparation for this communion with a sense of taking part in a great event which deepened my desire to grow into a "good" person. I was helped to think for myself and discuss the purpose of following Jesus in various retreats and reflection groups. I remember a priest, Père Clerc, whose modern ideas stirred me to question and to argue the Church's teachings and purpose: perfect for a teenager eager to start an argumentative discussion with her parents about the rôle of the Virgin Mary, for example. The understanding and tolerance I met then, helped me through years of decision-making at school and university.

My numerous visits to England introduced me to an English version of God "The Almighty", "My Lord", "Our Father" and a different denomination; all sharing the same faith with a different way of worshipping with fewer symbols but more hymn singing. When I spent one year in Bradford as French Assistant in a school, I often relied on God's help to find my words, to be as good as possible with the boys I was teaching. Perhaps, I called upon the father figure of my childhood God "Mon Père" as a comforting Father Head.

I want to believe that my destiny was to meet a Yorkshire boy during that year in Bradford. God has been and still is the guiding light in our married life.

It is hard to remain aware of God's deeds and nudges in our busy life. I try to see him in creation, in a friend's smile, in a sudden thought which make me alert to someone's need at that moment. I also like to imagine God at my side, giving me a discreet nudge or putting a comforting hand on my shoulder.

My "faith picture" is a long sinuous path leading to a bright light, a light so striking that we will only fully comprehend it when we reach the end of the path.

I thank God that his hands have always been stretched out to me when I experienced sadness, ill health, worries, despondency. God's hands are made visible through the caring and service of each one of us.

To expand on my "faith picture" as mentioned above, I imagine a network of similar paths each born from a different culture or even a different set of beliefs but all converging to that Light for the love of God and the Good of all people on earth.

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### **Methodist World Mission**

Jesus said "Blessed are the Peacemakers"

In August 2023, Rev. Andrew Ashdown, the UK Methodist Church Global partner was invited to take part in 2 days of discussion and prayer with Faith Leaders in Cameroon, to agree on strategies to promote peace in War Torn regions of their country. For 7 years there have been frequent violent attacks in Christian communities, in some regions of Cameroon by armed militant groups, causing thousands of deaths and injuries and many more internally displaced refugees.



You may have noticed in recent years how Bishop Fouki Samuel Forba has written with great distress the prayers for his country on day 5 of our prayer handbook. However, this year, he leads us in prayer with thanksgiving and hope. This is also encouraging for us to continue in prayer to support the peacemakers in Cameroon and neighbouring countries where conflict is not yet resolved.

This peace conference was coordinated by the All Africa Council of Churches at the request of the Forum of Justice and Peace in Africa as a whole. For 2 days Christian and Muslim leaders engaged in sincere and honest consideration of the challenges in achieving progress to ensure peace and wellbeing for the nation. Senior leaders of Christian and Muslim faith were appointed to implement the decisions agreed and listen to the concerns of citizens, so that trust and hope can be built up among people who have suffered for so long. The Cameroon Prime minister expressed support for the actions and agreed and the importance of the mediating role that religious leaders play to ensure peace and stability within the nation.

There is a report in one of the last year's Tearfund Prayer Diaries about their Church and Community Transformation (CCT) workshop held in Northern Cameroon. Bishop Forba was among the church leaders who participated. Many Pastors and church leaders in rural, isolated regions may have had no opportunity for Bible College training and no one nearby to turn to when they need support and encouragement themselves. CCT workers provide a listening ear and then build up on the Bible knowledge with study aids and preaching plans. Opportunities for fellowship with the wider community reduces loneliness and as a result, members of their

congregations are also renewed in their faith and learn together of their Godgiven skills and opportunities to help themselves and their neighbours towards a more peaceful and hopeful future.

Christian groups in neighbouring North Nigeria are also being targeted by militant groups. Zongkiwa Theological College was established in Kaduna state 35 years ago before this threat to security. Students come from a wide variety of denominations and ethnicities. More than 200 Methodist Ministers have graduated during these years, a full range of diploma and degree courses are offered and recently women students have been welcomed. The college is now a place of interreligious dialogue. Other Christian institutions have located themselves in this region of Nigeria, hoping that together they will be able to agree upon peaceful solutions to the multiple challenges. The College lacks funds to build a security wall around the campus or provide students with computers and internet access. Rev Ashdown participated in the All Africa Council of Churches conference held in Avuka Cathedral, under the title 'The Love of Christ compels us' - a strategy for the next 5 years was established to include peace making and Church and Community sustainable transformation. The All African Youth Congress also gathered under the banner 'Africa - my home, my future'. It is estimated that 70% of this continent's population are below the age of 30.

Last year, Rev Ashdown spent a few days in Northern Mozambique where more than a million people have been displaced to escape the violence of armed insurgents who have destroyed their villages. The deployment of an international peacekeeping force was withdrawn last year, allowing hostile gangs to return. This very large province is deeply forested which adds to their ongoing security difficulties. There is a limit to government resources and church members share the little they have. Overcrowded townships provide shelter and safety for families but no provisions for education, health care or basics like food, water and sanitation.

Bishop Maria Mucumba accompanied Rev Ashdown during his visit and demonstrated the sincere gratitude of villagers who had received a grant from the MWM fund to provide clean water from bore holes and a communal tap. She paid tribute for the legacy of faithful ministry by British missionaries in the past.

There are many other nations where peacemakers are working. May we be faithful in praying with our named Bishops and Superintendents each month.

#### Mental Health Awareness Week 2025



As I am sure you are aware, Christian Aid Week is May 11<sup>th</sup> to 17<sup>th</sup>.

But perhaps you were not aware that there is also a Mental Health Awareness Week, which runs from May  $12^{th}$  to  $18^{th}$ . In the last 20-30 years, there has been a huge increase in young people in particular suffering from mental health issues, which casts shadows over their future. In many cases this increase in mental health issues is caused – or greatly increased – by social media bullying. It is the opinion of mental health charities that people severely affected by mental illness are being left behind in the national conversation about mental health. A quote from Rethink Mental Health website:

"Those of us experiencing mental illness live in an unequal society. There's no two ways about it. Stigma. Discrimination. Lack of support. Limited access to housing, employment and social security. It doesn't make good reading. Some things are moving in the right direction. ... Stigma continues to decrease around mental health issues such as depression and anxiety. But, put simply, it's not enough. Those of us living with mental illness continue to be left behind. We have a shorter life expectancy than the rest of the population. Rising numbers of us continue to be detained under an outdated Mental Health Act. And amid a cost-of-living crisis, the government is considering billions of pounds worth of cuts to the social security system. Suicides are at their highest rate this millennium. Lives are being lost. This cannot go on."

This Mental Health Awareness Week wishes to draw attention to such issues as schizophrenia, which affects how one thinks and may cause sufferers to see or hear nonexistent things, bipolar disorder, which can cause mood swings between highs and extreme lows, and obsessive compulsive disorder (OCD) which is related to anxiety.

You might also have seen a few people wearing brightly-coloured lanyards decorated with sunflowers. This idea was developed by a staff member at Gatwick Airport to indicate wearers as someone with an invisible disability, usually a mental health issue, which requires those interacting with them to have special concern for their potential problems in dealing with everyday life. It is now used around the world in many environments, with some success in helping greater understanding of and consideration for sufferers.

The overall wish is that Mental Health Awareness Week should make us all more aware of the disabilities caused by mental health issues, and thus engender more consideration from all of us for those afflicted.

# The **Methodist** Church

**Fountains Abbey** is Britain's largest monastic ruin and one of the few National Trust properties with its own chaplaincy team.

"I may never know how I have supported our visitors, however if they felt welcomed and had the opportunity to chat in this awe inspiring place, then I'm sure that was helpful", says John Ridley who became a National Trust volunteer in 2016 before applying to join the chaplaincy team. Dr John Ridley is a retired primary school headteacher and former lecturer with the Open University. He worships at Richmond Methodist Church, North Yorkshire.



Many visitors are surprised to see a chaplain working among the Abbey ruins and the Georgian water gardens. The rôe involves engaging with visitors and a lot of chatting about the historic location.

About 15 miles northwest of York, Fountains Abbey was founded in 1132 by thirteen Benedictine monks and is now a world heritage site operated by the National Trust, attracting thousands of visitors each year.

"I am aware that many visitors have an emotional connection with Fountains Abbey, perhaps through family visits past and, for them, returning is rather like a pilgrimage" says John. "Some visitors are curious and ask questions about my role, and often talk about their own church connections. On one occasion, I met a family who, with special permission, were scattering their grandparent's ashes, for them this was clearly a very special place. For others, who were feeling tired and exhausted, simply arranging a lift on the minibus is an act of Christian kindness."

"Some eye contact, a smile, and a general comment such as 'How's your visit going?' usually gets someone talking. I avoid pestering people and it is usually obvious if visitors wish to follow up with a conversation. I am an abbey guide and, in my chaplain's role, often talk about the history of the abbey and the life of the monks. Medieval history can be a reflective topic and prompt discussions about belief; the abbey was, after all, a powerhouse of prayer for 400 years."

Chaplaincy has long been an important aspect of life at Fountains Abbey, "We are part of a long tradition of hospitality," says John. "Here the team works very much along the lines of the Cistercians who occupied the abbey until its dissolution in 1539, and traditionally welcomed travellers. St Benedict and his followers made a special effort to look after visitors and always looked for Christ in them. There is a sense that we carry on their legacy."

The Chaplaincy Team plays an important part in regular worship at the site, organising annual services in the abbey and leading the two Christmas 'Carols by Candlelight' services held in the cellarium, a large vaulted space in the ruins, each attracting around 300 visitors. On Good Friday, a chaplain leads a service and each summer a mass is held, alternately for St Benedict or St Bernard, both significant figures in the history of the abbey.

Justin Scully is General Manager for the National Trust at Fountains Abbey. "I feel chaplaincy is an essential part of what the Trust does. The team connect our visitors, and indeed our staff and volunteers to the long monastic history and spirituality of the World Heritage Site. We always say that Fountains is more than simply a visitor attraction, it is so much more special than that and the chaplaincy team are a vital part of making it a special place."
