A Word from one of our Ministers

Friends,

If you were at the Annual Church Meeting at the end of May, you heard me talk about tomato plants: I want to recap that somewhat for those who weren't able to join us that evening. Gavin shared the reading from John 15 about the vine and the branches, but I wanted to make it a little more relevant to my back garden, and perhaps yours, where I grow a couple of tomato plants each summer.

Tomato plants are great — they can grow vigorously and there are so many varieties that you can choose whether you prefer to grow cherry or beef tomatoes or anything in between! But tomato plants require particular care: one has to be careful to remove those pesky lateral shoots which grow so fast, and risk diverting the energy of the plant away from the fruit, which is what we want as gardeners.

Those laterals have to be cut out, just as the gardener pruned the vine in the Bible story. That which is not producing the right fruit, that which is diverting the energy of the plant away from fruiting, that which is just sideways growth without making true progress – all of that needs to be pruned out.

We are in a season now where Cornerstone is invited to prune, to focus, to direct its energy. And remember, the energy that Cornerstone runs on is largely OUR energy, yours and mine. There is a hefty shot of the Holy Spirit at work too for sure, but we need to be mindful of what WE are doing in partnership with the Spirit.

Pruning and cutting back can be painful, I know, and I am repeatedly challenged to consider what I might stop doing personally in order to focus, in order to be fruitful for God and for the Kingdom. That is the key point for me: my own pain at experiencing the pruning is managed by remembering that whatever I am experiencing in this pruning, it is for God's glory and for the Kingdom's growth. We don't do what we do at Cornerstone for ourselves or for our own glory but for God, every time and in every way.

We are called to be fruitful for God: how can we increase our fruitfulness in this season? How can we work together to focus our energy, our intentions and our time, so that we are fruitful for the Kingdom in Horsham and Partridge Green? What is God asking of us in this season? What does that fruitfulness actually look like? How we will know if we ARE being fruitful? What have we got to prune out of our own lives and potentially out of our church life together in order to focus on God's vision for us as Cornerstone in the years ahead? What difficult questions must we ask of ourselves in this moment? Lots to ponder and I invite you to pray about these questions in your own prayer times too, please.

Finally, as Gavin and Angela move towards the end of their active ministry in Cornerstone and across the Dorking and Horsham circuit, I want to thank Gavin in particular for his patience and grace with the probationer deacon who landed here in 2021. We joke that I wasn't exactly what he had been hoping for in stationing as he had looked for an ordained deacon, but nevertheless, Gavin gave me a great deal of help to get through probation and then shared in the joy of ordination in 2023.

Gavin has been a tower of support and encouragement to me in this first appointment and I have been glad to have him as my collaborator at Cornerstone, and as my Superintendent. I am sure that you will all join with me in praying for Gavin and Angela as they sit down this summer, and for much joy in their next chapter together.

My Testimony

My journey to faith has been long and sporadic; but marked by some stark, pivotal moments of realisation.

Although we did not attend church regularly as a child, my dad used to encourage me to say my prayers before bed each night and he sometimes took me to Sunday services at Lower Beeding Holy Trinity Church, where he had sung in the choir as a boy. But the most profound thing I ever remember him saying to me about belief was when I had become a parent: "You do know, don't you, boy?"

Witnessing the birth of my four children and only then realising my own mortality was a pivotal moment for me. My parents' love for me had been unconditional and I truly recognised what this meant when I had my own children. Universal love is important: I see the love of God everywhere reflected by and reciprocated through other people; as part of this universal love, I recognise the importance and cathartic, liberating power of forgiveness.


In the late 90s, two psychologists guardedly told me the results of a rigorously-timed, computer-based Myers & Briggs psychometric personality test. It was a revelation: as if they could read my innermost thoughts. At that time, I was an ISTJ (logistician) with introverted, sensing, thinking and judging traits. I was supposedly reliable and responsible; practical and detail-oriented, focusing on concrete facts and details, and good at problem-solving; orderly and organised, liking clear structures and procedures to be in place; loyal and traditional, respecting authority; and quiet and reserved. Most significantly, I almost invariably looked for hard evidence when making day-to-day decisions and life choices rather than trusting my emotions, intuition or instinct.

So, what hard evidence did I have for my faith? My immediate answer was in the wonders of Creation. The complex interrelationship and infinitesimal scale of everything in the universe made it hard for me to believe that it all evolved randomly by accident and was not consciously orchestrated. Surely, life forms are too advanced, beautiful, complex and fantastical to be purely random: who created them and how did each life form determine its next evolutionary step without a roadmap? Forget winning the National Lottery, ultimately, there was an infinitesimally miniscule statistical chance of me or you ever existing as the person

you are, let alone as any other person or indeed life form: so, are we all random and just very, very lucky; or are we each lovingly created and put on Earth as one of God's children?

Several times in my life, I have experienced some very powerful, revelatory episodes that I find very hard to explain: sometimes when I've been under a lot of stress and/or sometimes when my blood sugar has been getting low! These events have been like an epiphany or eureka moment: they have taken me through a process of catharsis followed by a period of total peace and calm. Everything in the world suddenly makes absolute sense: I have totally committed myself to God, my troubles have been purged and my belief is unwavering.

Something we need to remember

Rev Andy Dye, formerly a Mission Partner in Grenada, is now Global Relations Director for the British Connexional Team of 4 coOordinators, each overseeing the work on a specific continent, and reporting news of overseas Methodist Churches and workers, to encourage us to pray for the global Methodist church.

The term "global church" reminds us how much faster and simpler it has become to reach distant lands and to keep in touch with family and churches at home. Global Mission Fellows are young people who are

prepared to go anywhere for 2 years. Last year, Jesse Mhone arrived in the UK and is stationed with Wesley's Chapel in London, supporting their youth and social justice work.

Sadly, there is another aspect to these opportunities for the thousands who undertake treacherous journeys to Europe as refugees and asylum seekers. Our Mission Partners in Italy, Fiona Kendal and Matthew Laferty, continue to need our prayers together with the teams of Christians who run reception centres known as Mediterranean Hope in Italy, Bosnia and Lebanon. MH supplies immediate needs, such as food, clothes and shelter for families, some with malnourished and traumatised children. Using a language they can understand, basic public information is explained. Centres provide showers, laundries, health clinics and legal advice. Fiona works with the authorities in Italy to support immigrants through a safe and legal application process.

Matthew is Director of the Methodist Ecumenical Office in Rome, fostering joint action for peace and justice in all Christian traditions. Several million people are living the Methodist Way of Life in Italy. Since the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, last January, Matthew has regularly met with cardinals and other church leaders that "they may be one" as Jesus prayed for us (John 17). Matthew's home is a place of hospitality for the many visitors to Rome. He previously represented Methodists with ecumenical movements in Austria and directing an Urban Outreach Centre in Moscow.

In spite of the global aspect of mission, there are still 40% of the world's population who have never heard of Jesus. Approximately 11 million of the African diaspora now live in Europe, which has developed into a mission field on our doorsteps. Simon and his family spent 20 years living among an unreached people group in Tanzania, before returning to their home in London for their daughters to go to university. Their home church and the local refugee centre welcomed them to help with this cross-cultural neighbourhood endeavour. There are various reasons why overseas mission workers might return to the UK, maybe to be near elderly parents, for health reasons or because they have been evacuated from hostile threat.

Africa Inland Mission (AIM) was approached by members of a UK church who felt isolated amongst a large neighbourhood of African migrants who had no knowledge of Christianity. Simon and other AIM members responded and this led to the development of AIM Borderless UK about a decade ago. Now known as Borderless Europe, and in partnership with other cross-cultural missions & churches, opportunities have multiplied.

In the south of France, families from the islands off the coast of East Africa have settled. In Finland, Tim and his wife welcomed some Africans who already have a Christian faith and together they started a Borderless ministry, opening a welcome centre in northern Europe. Borderless is becoming a global movement with centres as far apart as Montreal and Hong Kong. AIM retirees Matthew and his wife have recently relocated to Australia to mobilise Christians to share the borderless love of Jesus among the myriad nationalities who now call that continent home.

There are many UK cities where Borderless members work: Kay returned to care for her mother in Edinburgh following many years as a health worker in East Africa. She has joined the Parish Public Health team who work in clinics, schools and do home visits, allowing her to direct families to the church's cross-cultural community centre. Two of her fellow AIM members are now in Edinburgh having spent 25 years teaching in an international school. Jo holds parenting classes and preschool education with volunteers from the church. It is an advantage if small children understand English before entering school: some mothers have never had formal schooling so meeting in a relaxed and conversational environment helps them to learn the responsibilities of parenting. Frank volunteers in a secondary school where migrant teenage boys struggle in an environment which frequently feels hostile to them

One of the earliest Borderless groups exists in Cardiff where many Somali people have settled. Lee and her family partner with student volunteers and church members to run similar events as those in Edinburgh. People can join sewing classes, or cookery demonstrations during English conversation sessions. Some men's groups meet in cafes or pubs to talk about sport, employment, and family responsibilities, for example.

The Somali Bible Society has an ambition to train 5000 evangelists to preach the gospel within their own land. Four of the long-established Bible Translation Societies now have Africans leading them. Many Christian agencies and missions are collaborating with African churches to challenge and disciple their own members to GO as missionaries to countries within Africa.

Horsham and Crawley Pride Events

You may recall that **Cornerstone church** supported the **Horsham Pride** event last year.


