

Report on spring Sustaining Hope gathering 17.5.25



Twelve of us met at Redhill Methodist Church. After introducing ourselves and the ways in which we are involved in supporting refugees and other vulnerable migrants, we opened with worship. We were very conscious of images in the media of devastated children in conflict zones and the intolerable decisions their parents have to make. We reflected together on the relevance of Exodus 1.8-2.10 in today's world and we prayed through *Singing the Faith* 700, 'God weeps'.



The first presentation was given by Carolyn Thom, founder of *Their Voice*, which supports people, mainly women and children, rescued from modern slavery (https://theirvoicemodernslavery.org.uk). Begun 10 years ago, in a bedroom in Caterham, last year the charity supported 1,825 people, of whom 43% were women, 43% children and 14% men. They gifted 675 toiletry packs to counter hygiene poverty and 1,091 customised clothing packs of new or preloved items. Survivors are free to choose clothing that reflects their personal style. After being forced to wear certain clothes by their captors, this helps to rebuild self-esteem and confidence, emphasizing that they are deserving of respect and dignity. In addition, last year *Their Voice* held three 10-week empowerment workshops to boost participants' confidence, help them gain essential skills and build lasting support networks. All this helps survivors thrive beyond the safe house, engage with the community and pursue opportunities for personal and professional growth.

Carolyn's commitment was palpable and her enthusiasm infectious. She will be glad to talk about the charity to any groups in the District. She reminded us that modern slavery is 'hidden in plain sight' in towns, cities and the countryside across the UK. It takes many

forms and forces thousands of men, women and children into crime, sex, labour, marriage and drug trafficking. The effects of the exploitation and abuse are devastating and recovery takes a lifetime. As *Their Voice* expands, there is great need for more volunteers to sort items; hold fundraising events and publicize its work both in the community and on social media. The second, equally inspirational presentation was from Andrea Campion-Smith and Rosemary Lee, who have been involved from the start in *ChitChat*, at Guildford St. Mary's Anglican/ Methodist LEP. Andrea explained how, ten years ago, members of Guildford Methodist Church made a bold, mission-led move from their fine premises on the fringe of the city to join with an elderly dwindling congregation just off the High Street. Refurbishing the medieval parish church and revitalising the congregation, they prayerfully sought what their contribution to the community could now be - and settled on drop -in activities, providing a warm welcome, and an opportunity to chat: an oasis of calm on a busy High Street. They focused particularly on the city's many international residents, including au pairs and people associated with the university. At *ChitChat* they could practise English informally and meet and make friends.

After 12 months of praying, planning and viewing groups working with international residents in different ways, they had recruited volunteers not only from their own congregation but ecumenically. They asked themselves, "'How do we know that *ChitChat* is what God wants us to do?' We thought the answer was probably that we would not find enough volunteers if it wasn't God's will. Within six months of us opening, we had 32 volunteers representing most of the town centre churches, some coming weekly, some fortnightly, some monthly. *ChitChat* has now been running for 10 years and we asked the same question, 'How do we know that this is still what God wants us to do?' We checked our list of volunteers. The number is still 32, although obviously not the same 32 people." Training and planning sessions are still run twice a year, one on listening skills, aimed at allowing guests time to think and formulate their responses; the other on cultural differences and awareness

Rosemary described the content of a morning: they take a different subject each week, with questions and visual aids as a prompt - though conversation can go in all sorts of different directions! But *ChitChat_*also means that guests can ask questions, make friends and find out about life in Guildford and how to register with doctors, dentists etc and access emergency services.

Sessions finish with a fun practical activity. We share in a 'taster' Lucky Dip bag with simple questions to answer about our interests or skills.

Rosemary considered how *ChitChat* has evolved over the last 10 years, as political circumstances have changed:

- Initially they were hosting mainly au pairs, and helping address their working conditions (unfair treatment; inadequate pay). Since Brexit there have been far fewer European guests
- Subsequent waves of refugees, from Syria, Hong Kong, Ukraine, Afghanistan, Iran, Iraq etc. have often had more basic needs
- Individual advocacy supports guests in their dealings with: schools (and appeals); housing (landlords refusing to address building, electrical and plumbing issues etc.), legal problems; family matters etc.
- Form-filling is always a challenge for guests, regardless of the culture they are from.
- Racism is experienced by many, eg, GP's or dentist's staff ignoring or dismissing someone with little English who seeks to register - but readily responding when they realize the guest is accompanied by an English person.

In the process of such challenges however, many valuable friendships have been formed between guests and volunteers

Andrea and Rosemary closed the presentation with a short video (consents had gladly been given) of a session where guests had been invited to bring something to represent a skill they had. Contributions of crafts, clothing, food, practical gifts, music and dance were all enthusiastically celebrated.

After sharing what we would be taking home from this Gathering, we closed with song and prayers.

Carol Steel

I was born Carolyn Anne Ogilvy Gordon on March 5th during the Clydebank blitz...in the cellar and that's all I can remember.

The rest of this article was written with the help of my daughter.

When you think of Carol Steel (my mother) it's hard not to think of her compassion or her quick wit but did you know she is Scottish?. Of course you do because she is a very proud Scot. She was born around the Clyde bank blitz and her family had to take shelter in the cellar to escape. 100s died, many more were injured and over 8000 homes were destroyed.

She grew up surrounded by faith. (She was able to quote the Bible backwards). Her father the Rev Walter Gordon was a Scottish Presbyterian minister while her Mother played the organ and wrote the children's sermons. She also wrote a column for the People's Friend called "A view from the Manse window".

When Carol was a child she would travel with her dad to see his parishioners but was always told to sit quietly.

When she was four years old she ran away from home crossing a buy road and went to school only to be brought back home by one of the teachers. (She can tell you of quite a few more misdemeanors).

Carol attended university in Edinburgh on the path to becoming a teacher. She loved to dance and taught Scottish country dancing. In fact she met her beloved husband Bill at a dance. Since Bill was older and headed to a party and Carol didn't wish to be home by her curfew she decided to go with him. And so began a wonderful romance. They got married and had 2 children, move to England and created a home full of much love and laughter. But in the middle of all this was Carol's faith. Not long after moving to England Bill got ill. This was a shock to Carol as at that time she was caring for her sister who had aggressive breast cancer and a mother with dementia. Every day she asked God for strength, guidance and the ability to keep moving forward. Sadly after 29 years of marriage Bill passed away age 59. Her sister and mother followed soon after. Bill's death impacted Carol's life in a massive way. She still talks about his laugh and those of you who knew Bill would know this huge man with a booming laugh.

Carol had completed a second degree in education and went on to teach at St Catherine's in Crawley and Queen Elizabeth II (QE 2) in Horsham. With her gift of kindness and ability to help others she excelled in the field for children with exceptional needs and different learning disabilities. She went on to become the deputy head, then head forging friendships that are still strong today.

Carol plays Bridge, scrabble, love a good crossword and is excellent at most game shows on television until it comes to sports and current events.

Never wavering in her faith despite so many sad events and very knowledgeable about it Carol was always ready to defend it. She seldom missed a service often searching for churches to visit as she travelled the world. Carol gave in all aspects.

Carol came to London Road in the late eighties. In her time she was a church Steward for over six years (fondly called Hinge to Denise Sillett's Bracket), served as a communion Steward, was part of the Church Council and a welcoming steward. She also helped clean the church and collected and drove the elderly to lunch club and other church activities until she realized she was older than many of them.

Carol is a fantastic mother to me and my brother Michael. She ensured that we were raised in a safe home surrounded by love and laughter while teaching us the difference between right and wrong. We both attended church with her and went to "Bible school "in the summer holidays. Michael is happily married with two fantastic sons and lives close by, keeping a good eye on her and pop in for daily visits. I moved to the USA after getting married to my husband James. I've got two lovely daughters and four amazing grandchildren which makes Carol a grandmother of four and great grandmother of four. We visit often and I try to get over four or five times a year. Carolyn Anne Ogilvy Steel is one much loved lady!

A note from Michael and myself... a huge thank you to Jay Dunning who has continued to enable mum to be part of her beloved church community and to all those who keep in touch and continue to bring joy to her life it is very much appreciated. . A church family is invaluable especially to people like our mum who lives on her own.



Worship on board a cruise ship

On holidays it is often difficult to attend Sunday worship, but on most Cruise Ships a Sunday service is arranged. The Borealis did so. And although there were only about 20 people (none sat on the front row) I could feel the presence of God. A simple service but moving.

Here is the Seafarer's Version of the 23rd Psalm:

The Lord is my pilot, I shall not drift.

He lighteth me across dark waters.

He steereth me in deep channels. He keepeth my log.

He guideth me by the star of holiness for His name's sake.

Yea, even midst the thunders and tempests of life,

I dread no danger; for Thou art with me,

Thy love and Thy care, they shelter me.

Thou preparest a harbour before me in the homeland of Eternity.

Thou annointest the waves with oil – my ship rides calmly.

Surely sunlight and starlight shall favour me on the voyage I take,

And I will rest in the port of my God forever. Amen.

Having grown up near a Merchant Seamen's training school and having ancestors linked to the sea, this was very moving, as were the prayers for the ship and all travellers. (My Uncle was a shipwright for submarines for example). The sea can be unpredictable and many seamen have a strong faith.

One of the talks on the ship highlighted how the Norwegian Navy and merchant ships came to the UK to support the war effort, bringing the Norwegian King and Government. The 'Shetland Bus' was made up of Norwegian fishing vessels which went back and forth to Norway supporting the resistance movement and bringing some refugees back to the UK. Our country has strong links to Norway and now I understand why. After the second world war with NATO in place it was felt there would be no more wars in Europe. As we go forward in 2025 I pray that this belief will be realised and that diplomacy will win through.

The Leprosy Mission Update



"Unclean, Unclean, Unclean" was the cry in biblical times and the response was often "Go away, Go away, Go away" to sufferers of Leprosy. Still in the twenty first century it still is the response in many countries of the world. Back in February Jenny Jackson introduced us to the work of The Leprosy Mission who in 2024 celebrated their 150 anniversary. She reminded us that the mission was founded by Wellesley Bailley and his wife following a visit to India to his brother who was working there.

They were taken to a Leprosy Colony and were appalled at he conditions and treatment the suffers were experiencing. He wrote afterwards "If ever there was a Christ-like work in the world, it was to go amongst these poor suffers and bring them the consolation of the gospel". In those days there was no cure. Methodist missionary Mary Reed from the USA lived with a colony of about 500 affected by leprosy in North India for 5 years before becoming a sufferer herself. She devoted the rest of her life to caring for them.

Today there is a multi-drug therapy that it was approved by the World Health Organisation in 1981. She also told us the Horsham played a part in that story. As well as hospitals they have well-equipped mobile teams travelling to more remote areas of the countries they operate in. We can so easily complain about our wonderful health service but for many in the world their nearest hospital can be 200 miles away or more and the poor have no resources to travel. Today supporters of the Mission faithfully continue to pray and receive a prayer diary and magazine three times a year.

To help you understand some of the issues that the mission faces every day I quote from a recent month's prayer topics.

"Niger is one of the poorest countries in the world. On the frontline of the climate crisis, droughts and hunger are sadly all too common. A coup in 2023 plunged the country further into crisis. It's a tough place to be affected by leprosy. Healthcare is hard to find, and the stigma and poverty continue to devastate lives. But thanks to you, people in Niger don't have to face this disease alone. Temperatures can reach

40 degrees C at this time of year, threatening health, and crops. Pray that the Lord will shield people who rely on begging from the heat and protect precious crops. Please pray too that God" will send rain at the right time so that people can grow enough food.

"Danja is the only Christian hospital in Niger, this sanctuary is a beacon of hope for people affected by the disease. Praise God for the dedicated staff as they shine out the love of Jesus, welcoming every patient with open arms. May He give the team skills to heal physical wounds, and words of love to reassure broken hearts. At Danja Hospital people affected by leprosy receive the vital care they need free of charge. From the cure to surgery to wheelchairs, the team works to restore dignity and independence. Give thanks for the recent opened eye clinic, which is helping to prevent blindness caused by leprosy. Pray that patients will find new hope for the future and feel the love of Jesus through the care they receive".

"The old leprosy wards and toilets at Danja Hospital urgently need renovation so the team can continue giving leprosy patients the best possible care. Ask that the Lord will provide the funds and the skills needed to complete this work, so patients have the comfort and dignity they deserve".

SHARE THE STORY (or Tea-towels on our heads)

We have just received an email from one of the parents of a child at All Saints saying "how much we love you all coming in and how it's a great opportunity to learn Bible stories." So that's encouraging!

July 2025 marks the end of our first year as "Share the Story" an ecumenical group taking Bible stories to All Saints Church of England primary school. We moved away from "Open the Book" (the programme produced and supported by the Bible Society that we have used for many years). This was done to give us more flexibility with the stories that we use, allowing us to fit in better with the themes being used by the school.



We still (where possible) use the Lion Children's Bible for our dramatised stories but write our own reflections and prayers for the school's assemblies. Our group of 9 travelling actors come from 3 different churches across Horsham and we usually have 6 or 7 members available for any given assembly.

Over the school year we have shared the stories of the Feeding of the 5,000 (God provides for us), the Washing of the Disciples' Feet (God loves us), the Wise

and Foolish Bridesmaids (Wisdom) and the Prodigal Son (Forgiveness). We dress in character (see photograph) and use appropriate props, we also (where possible) provide some children's parts for the pupils. It is so rewarding to see the children listening to and engaging with God's story and we are pleased to receive positive feedback from the school (see the quote above).

We aim to provide 2 assemblies a term to All Saints, but excitingly we have been given the opportunity to lead one assembly a term at Arunside Primary School. Unlike All Saints this is not a church school so we look forward to sharing God's story (perhaps for the first time) to a whole new group of children.

Outside of our school work we were also pleased to share the nativity story with our Toddler group children at their Christmas party.

If there is anyone in the Cornerstone congregation who would be interested in joining our little band, then please have a word with either Beverley or Trefor Little. We usually meet for a Thursday morning rehearsal lasting about an hour in preparation for each assembly which will take place a week or so later (on Thursday for All Saints and Monday for Arunside). You get to dress up but there are no words to learn and you'll experience the excitement of children sharing in the Good News of what God does for his people and his creation.
