A Word from one of our Ministers

Dear Friends,

As the autumn leaves change colour and fall and the days grow shorter, we find ourselves once again in the season of Remembrance —a time marked by solemn reflection and heartfelt gratitude. Remembrance Day itself invites us to pause, remember, and honour those who have served and sacrificed in conflicts past, as well as those who continue to serve our country in times of need. Whether in moments of war or peace, their courage and dedication have helped to shape the world we live in.

That peace, so hard won is yet so fragile, and we can see this so readily in the world around us. Every time we pick up our newspapers or turn on the news, we see fresh atrocities somewhere in the world that remind us that this is so. And with wars in the Middle East and in Europe, and threats of war abounding our world is such a fragile place right now.

Within our church community and the wider nation, Remembrance Sunday has never been so important. It is a call to remember the cost of freedom, the pain of loss, and the enduring hope for peace. As we wear our poppies and stand in silence on the day itself, we acknowledge the stories behind each name that we hear or come into our minds—lives lived, dreams pursued, and families forever changed. We remember not only the soldiers on the front lines but also those whose lives were touched by conflict in countless, often unseen ways too.

On recent visits to France and Belgium Mandy and I have taken the opportunity to visit some of the war cemeteries that are along the coastline. I remember going to the US Ardennes Cemetery, and standing at one end looking to the other, row upon row of headstones, each commemorating a loss, and each with a story behind of immense courage ad bravery. And maybe for the first time the scale of the wars and the loss of life associated with them hit me. Before it had just been numbers, now not so. I had to hold back the tears for these men, who are unknown to me, but who won for you and I the peace and freedom we have been guilty of taking for granted.

We visited another cemetery, a Canadian one at Beny-sur-Mer where we saw a similar site, but my eyes were drawn to the grave of a Padre, Walter Leslie Brown. On the 3 June 1944 he boarded a transport ship bound for Normandy, as the seas became rough around them he moved among the troops on board to offer comfort and prayer to these men who knew the horror that awaited them on the "other" side of their journey. Walter was the first Canadian Padre to land at Juno beach on the 6th June 1944 carrying with him only a suitcase in which was everything he needed to be able to minister to and support the men whom he had been called to serve. Sadly, on the 7th June as Walter was delivering supplies to the men who were fighting, the jeep in which he was travelling was intercepted by Hitler Youth forces who were under orders not to take any prisoners. The corporal he was with was killed instantly. Walter was taken, but soon afterwards was executed, his body dumped by the side of the road, where it was found weeks later, and identified by his suitcase which was beside him. A very moving story that I happened across, one of many in that cemetery.

Remembrance can't simply be about looking back. It is about letting the lessons of history guide us as we move forward. The world, as we know, faces new challenges and uncertainties. In the midst of global unrest, wars in the Middle East, and on our doorstep in Europe again, as well as in other parts of the world. There are Tyrants Rising and gaining power, as well as hard right wing politics gaining popularity. There are our own personal struggles, and social divisions too. Now, perhaps more than ever, the values of compassion, sacrifice, and unity feel more important. What might it mean for us, as followers of Christ, to carry the spirit of remembrance into the future? What is ours to do as individuals and churches should war become part of our lived experience again?

Perhaps it all begins with a renewed commitment to peace—both in our hearts and in our community. The message of the Gospel calls us to be peacemakers, bridge-builders, and advocates for justice. As we remember those who have gone before us, let us also be inspired to act with courage and kindness in our daily lives. Let every act of service, every word of encouragement, and every prayer for healing be a living tribute to the legacy of the fallen who we honour at this time of year.

As a church, we have the unique opportunity to be a beacon of hope for those around us. Let us then, look to the future with faith, trusting that God is working in and through us to bring about a world marked by reconciliation and love. May our remembrance this year, open our hearts to new possibilities—opportunities to serve, to comfort, to listen, and to grow together as a family united in Christ.

And, in the coming weeks, as we look ahead to Advent and the promise of new beginnings, may we carry forward the lessons of remembrance. Let us continue to pray for peace in our world, healing in our communities, and strength for all who feel the burdens of the past. And let us step forward together, confident that the God who holds our memories also holds our future in His loving hands.

Ukraine Christian Ministries

UCM is a small charity with low running costs so every donation provides food, medication and shelter. Ella Pevseedoss, the leader works closely with church—leaders as they support people trapped in poverty. During COVID and then the—disruption of war, she kept contact with pastors via the internet and was able to help them with funds to adapt church premises into housing for families displaced by the war. The words of Isaiah 41:10 became their daily encouragement 'Do not fear, for I am your God... I will strengthen you and help you'. People with many skills were needed at these sanctuaries, health workers, caterers, teachers and counselors. Others would search for quantities of food and fuel for warmth, and transport.

A carpenter named Vitaly has become known as the 'wise carpenter' as he passes his skills on to the next generation at schools and church camps and has trained others to continue instructing Ukraine's future workforce when they are able to commence rebuilding. At the beginning of this year the church building at Dengehi was destroyed by fire and Ella was able to send £10,000 for the church to be rebuilt. As the rebuild continues attendance at youth activities have grown as an increasing number of children are sent to this region for the summer school holidays. Church members hold all age holiday camps and clubs catering for more than 600 young people. During the winter months the house bound are grateful for the delivery of home cooked meals, fire wood, medication and a visitor for company.

Recently 2 key church leaders were called for military service. Vlad was sent to the front line as a chaplain and understands the anxiety soldiers feel for their families at home or those who've migrated to a safer country. Denis, an energetic youth worker, spent time in the UK for military training before being posted to the front line. In August he was seriously injured and had his legs amputated.

Please hold the work of Ukraine Christian Ministries as they attempt to take the gospel to every community, meeting their material needs and equipping Ukrainians for a brighter future.

Prayer @ Cornerstone

Whenever two of you on earth agree about anything you pray for, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three people come together in my name, I am there with them. Matthew 18: 19-20

Prayer is a vital foundation for us as Christians and there are many ways in which everyone at Cornerstone can participate both individually and communally. A **prayer group** meets on Tuesday mornings at London Road to pray for the needs of others and our world at 9.30am and all are welcome.

Prayer bookmarks are available in each chapel during the first weeks of the month. Over a six-monthly period the topics cover areas of Cornerstone life, prayers for the people who live in our roads and pointers for prayer for different overseas missions, so please take one and pray for the life of our church and beyond.

At St Andrew's for many years there has been a **prayer shawl** ministry where volunteers have prayed whilst knitting shawls & scarves using a simple three-stitch pattern to represent the Trinity. These are then given, with a prayer card, to people in hospital, those who are suffering loss or who have had a new baby. The stock of prayer shawls has run low so if you enjoy knitting and would like to be part of this important prayer ministry then please contact me.

The weekly email includes a **prayer list** for people who need prayer for a period of time so if you know of someone who has given their permission for prayer then please contact **pastoral.sec@ cornerstone-mc.org.uk**.

A **prayer chain** operates between the three chapels for urgent prayer where a group of people receive a text message when someone is needing prayer immediately such as in the case of illness or bereavement. The prayer chain contacts are Sandra Artes for London Road, Stephanie Kirkcaldy for Partridge Green and myself for St Andrew's but please ensure that you have the person's permission before requesting prayers for them. So please get involved in this vital ministry in our shared life in whatever way suits you best. Zimbabwe

Reporting about his visit to Zimbabwe in November 2003, Rev Andrew Ashdown writes about the truly devastating drought - for hundreds of miles the land is parched - rivers and dams are dry. Animals are clearly starving, searching aimlessly for food and water. Local people and farmers, unable to grow crops to feed themselves and livestock. Other countries in Southern and Eastern Africa also have been suffering more frequently from changes in weather patterns.

MWM funds have been invested to provide lifesaving water by digging boreholes for Methodist schools, children's care homes and skills training centres. In some isolated areas, churches have distributed food aid to starving families and saved many lives. Rev Ashdown felt humbled by their gratitude and perseverance and their faith that gives them hope for the future that 'there is always light beyond the darkness'.



Jonathan and Isobel Hill have been our long-term mission partners in Zimbabwe and are members of the Bulawayo District Synod where their home and church bases are, and Jonathon heads the maths department at Thakwana Methodist Secondary school, and Isobel spends her time overseeing the care of orphans and vulnerable children in this widespread district.

In 1960, Rev Matthew Ruskiki founded the orphanage which bears his name and is now one of the largest Child Welfare organisations in the country. At the gates, a welcome sign reads 'A Christ woven nest for orphans and vulnerable children'. More than 100 receive residential care including education for all ages and abilities. An additional 1000 children are cared for in the community-based fostering schemes. Isobel and her team of nurses and health care professionals are responsible for oversight of each child and their care giving families in the Bulawayo province. A second Matthew Risike home has been established, doubling the number of children receiving care. Jonathan and Isobel are on the management board for both. MWM funds have been invested to dig bore holes at both sites and have literally become life savers for the communities and also enabled Jonathan to

provide food for families around his school in Thekwane. Isobel has introduced 'health living' and the orphanages are using spare land to grow vegetables and keep chickens. She donates clothes and educational items to cover costs of school fees.

Another enduring legacy has been the schools and skills training centre near Mavandeva, which was founded more than 100 years ago by missionaries and originally as theological college, but converted to an all age school in 1960 for 2000 students. Apart from the high quality academic education, training in building, carpentry, textiles and farming all equip students with employment skills and casual labour for local people who may not have been able to complete education. The school has a productive vegetable garden and poultry rearing which, as well as education, contribute to the healthy diets needed by all children, not only orphans. All these made possible and supported by the investment of boreholes on site.

The same applies to the remarkable Waddilove Farm, under the inspired manager, Tawanda Sumani. Every year, sufficient meat, eggs and vegetables are produced to supply all the churches, schools, children's homes and the caring foster families, as well as surplus to sell at the markets. Read Rev Ashdown's report on the Methodist website for some amazing figures of beef, pork, poultry, eggs, tomatoes produced during 2024. Since then, the cost of supplying many livestock feeds has been high. The river, dam and fishponds are all dry but the deep borehole has not failed.

Rev Ashdown attended the official opening and dedication of a sewing factory situated at the Methodist Youth Centre, a few miles from Bulawayo. Their aim is to produce high quality but low-cost uniforms for all students at the Methodist schools in the country and eventually, for state schools as well, providing employment and training for local people and significant income for the church.

The bishop, whose vision is to enable the churches to be self-sustaining, sold his car to raise funds to lay the foundation for this factory. He expressed his gratitude to the Mission Fund for supplying the bulk of the finance for this impressive investment. Modern machines and equipment fill in a bright and healthy production room, maintaining energy saving and ethical standards. At the dedication ceremony, Bishop Mawire includes in his prayers 'May all who enter these premises sense God's presence, power and love'.

Thousands of people gather in a very large church for the annual music festival where church and school choirs compete for awards. Music is at the heart of Methodist worship and allows connection between all age groups, ensuring that membership of the Methodist Church in Zimbabwe has a future, proclaiming that 'God is good - all the time.'

UK Recognition of Palestinian Statehood: A Step Towards Justice and Peace

The UK Prime Minister, Sir Keir Starmer, has formally announced the UK's recognition of the State of Palestine.

This marks a significant and welcome shift in British foreign policy, moving away from using recognition as leverage in negotiations, and instead affirming the Palestinians' inherent right to self-determination and equal participation in peace talks.

This decision, in line with similar moves by other nations, increases international pressure on Israel over its occupation policies and the ongoing crisis in Gaza, which many experts, including most recently, the United Nations Independent International Commission of Inquiry on the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and Israel, have described as genocide.

Critics, including the Israeli government, argue that this recognition rewards terrorism and undermines peace. However, the Prime Minister made it clear that Hamas must have no role in any future government. Importantly, millions of Palestinians have resisted occupation through non-violent means for generations - this recognition is a long-overdue acknowledgment of their peaceful struggle.


We welcome this new stance by the British Government and urge it not only to recognise Palestinian statehood but also to use every diplomatic channel to secure an immediate ceasefire, humanitarian access, and a renewed commitment to a just peace.




