## A Word from one of our Ministers

Friends,

It is always slightly strange to be writing this so long before Christmas, but this is the system and so we do! But you will need to bear with me whilst I get to Christmas now...

I read somewhere recently that faith requires us to relinquish control. That concurs with the 12 step programme, which uses the word "surrender" in relation to a Higher Power. We are constantly battling the ways of the world, our own humanity and our desires – all against the call of God on our lives. We have fears and beliefs around what we think is possible and I see a national church with falling membership, a local church struggling with reducing numbers of volunteers and financial challenges. I suspect that some of us think that it is impossible for us to bring the church, local or national, back into growth, to turn around the trajectory; I think I would agree. It is indeed likely to be impossible FOR US. But not for our God.

Humanity tends to see the challenges, the negative, the hurdles. I don't *know* what God focuses on. I *suspect* that God is more interested in the man who slid into the back row on Sunday morning for only his second visit and saw how warmly he was welcomed. I *think* God is interested in the conversations I have been having with another man who is being increasingly drawn to church events and who wants to encounter God. I *hope* God is watching over the Monday night course and is encouraged by the depths of the conversations which are happening, where people are feeling a bit uncomfortable, but they keep coming. I *know* God is moving amongst the families at Messy Church and is inspiring our volunteers. God is drawing new people into conversations at the Friday Café, and the community that uses the Cafes that run alongside the Community Fridge on Tuesdays and Thursdays is growing stronger too. These are green shoots of promise.......

If faith does indeed require us to surrender to God's will, that sounds tricky. You might disagree – that's OK too. For me, Christmas is an opportunity to reflect further on this: look at what God did through Elizabeth and Zechariah, through Mary and Joseph, and their lives. Could we set aside our own agendas and desires, ambitions and ideas, and realise that WE cannot do the work for the growth of Cornerstone on our own, but that God indeed can do it, if it is God's will (and we might need to be open to the idea that it might not be: God might have a bigger plan). Then we would be able to join Mary in the soaring praise of the Magnificat in the words of that lovely hymn: "Tell out my soul, the greatness of the Lord!"

This Christmas, would you join me in seeking out the tiny, tender shoots of hope that spring up from the stumps of the past, and find joy and deep peace in doing God's will, for the sake of the Kingdom?

As we begin Advent together now, my prayer is that we are all able to take some time to pause in the hurly-burly of the Christmas madness and appreciate afresh all that God came to earth as Emmanuel to be for us. In time, I wish you and all your families the joy of the Christmas season, and the blessings of the Christ-child, fresh from heaven in the manger, vulnerable and precious, as every new baby is. May we know that deep peace that comes from knowing Jesus, now and evermore.

Bookworms who enjoy reading the Nol Ladies Detective Agency series (by Alexander McCall Smith) set in Botswana, may, like me, feel an empathy with the main characters who combine lovingkindness with justice and forgiveness. Respectful reference is made to their former King Seretse Khama. His grandfather Khama III converted to Christianity in the late 19th century. King Seretse was exiled to Britain and whilst here met and married his English wife Ruth.



When they returned, Seretse became Botswana's popular president until his death. His son Ian Kharma followed as President until last year, when he was crowned, thus restoring the royal families' status.

The town of Serowe is the administrative capitol of the Kingdom. From there, the Royal burial ground is a protected site in the nearby hills where the town of Shoshong had previously been an important base for explorers and early missionaries, including David Livingstone. Their graves are also at this historical site. Shoshong is now situated in the valley, where water is more accessible. The first Methodist church met here under trees but they now have about 70 members and a useful building led by a faithful Lay Preacher. The ordained ministers for Methodists in both these towns live 115 kms away so the churches depend on untrained leadership.

In the 1960's South African workers were posted to work in the settlements and towns along the route of the railway lines they were laying, to link South Africa with Zimbabwe. The Methodist Church members among them gathered for worship and prayer which laid the foundation for growth and now there are Methodist churches scattered across most of this vast and wild country. There are an increasing number of indigenous members but the majority continue to be foreign workers and their families. There are still only 8 ordained Methodist Ministers and they are all S.African responsible for 5 large circuits.

The Bishop lives in the nation's capital Gaberone which forms one of the circuits and has 3 of the Ministers. The circuit in the N.west of Botswana has no minister and the Bishop travels 850 kms to hold Holy Communion services for widely scattered

congregations in isolated places without road access. There is a substantial church building and a manse at Maun and a Bible Woman' has been appointed to lead their ministry. It is the Bishop's prayer to have indigenous leaders trained and ordained but the nearest bible schools and teachers are all in S.Africa. The cost and distance from home are enormous obstacles for all lay leaders. He is praying for a Missionspartner to come and set up a Bible school and training centre in his country. Most members and leaders have not fully understood the basic teaching of 'The Methodist way of life' or the deeper truths of the Bible.

However, there are many faithful leaders like Rev. Machola who is the only ordained minister for the Lobatse circuit. He travels for many days to visit 500 members in 40 isolated locations. In some of them the church owns land for development. At Pitsane there is a thriving school with 700 students. Rev Machola and the Principle, with 60 teaching staff, provide more than education. Many children are neglected and malnourished. Food is provided daily and orphans are cared for but lack of facilities hamper their efforts. There is land around the school but the church does not have resources to develop the site. A partially built hostel has remained incomplete for 40 years. Land was used to grow crops and rear livestock but the lengthy and widespread drought during 2024 destroyed this project. Just one of the many problems which affect these most vulnerable children Day 6 prayers in our handbook encourages the regular opportunity to pray with our Methodist family in this relatively peaceful country.

#### Should we still be taking the offertory plate up during a service?



This was the question posed to the Learning and Worship Forum, raised from a concern about how this related to people who are experiencing poverty.

We commented that this is a question we should have considered a long time ago when we were passing a collection plate round. Did it occur to us that some people would be anxious about needing to be seen putting something in, perhaps worried about being judged by how much they were seen contributing?

We now have a plate by the door, a practice that developed out of the pandemic, which, combined with online giving, may have reduced that pressure and anxiety.

Being sensitive to those who are experiencing poverty is still important and something we shouldn't lose sight of, but the purpose of having the offertory is not just about giving money – it has a much greater spiritual significance that we have perhaps forgotten or overlook in our established routines.

The offertory as part of our worship is one of the ways we can express our thanks for God's rich generosity to us. The act of bringing the offertory plate up within the context of worship (even if it is empty because all the gifts have been given online) is a symbolic offering of ourselves, our values, priorities and resources, both individually and communally, to God.

For this reason, the Learning and Worship Forum have decided that we actually need to make this a more significant moment in our worship.

So from the first Sunday in December, those leading worship will be asked to always include a time in their order of service when the offertory plate can be brought to the front with a prayer expressing thanks for all the gifts given, however this has been done, as well as acknowledging that we are offering ourselves to God in thanksgiving for all that God has done for us.

To make this a more symbolic and significant corporate act we are also going reintroduce, for those who are able, an invitation to the congregation to stand when the offertory plate is brought forward.
