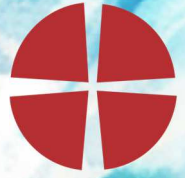

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A Word from one of our Ministers

Dear friends,

Christ is risen! That feels strange to say because as I write this letter we are approaching the third Sunday of Lent, but as you read it will be Easter Day or thereabouts. So, Christ is Risen, and I can hear your rousing response – “He is risen indeed. Alleluia!”

At Easter we do not simply remember a past event; we receive again the living promise of God: that love is stronger than death, hope is stronger than fear, and that the risen Jesus goes ahead of us into our tomorrow. Wherever you are reading this from, may the peace of the Lord fill your home and steady your heart.

In the Gospels the Easter news meets people in all sorts of places: a garden at dawn, a locked room, a road where hearts are heavy and hopes are confused. That is good news for us too, because it means there is no place in our lives that is ‘out of bounds’ for the risen Christ. He comes to those who rejoice and to those who struggle; he speaks peace where we are anxious; he calls us by name when we feel unseen.

Easter speaks of **new life** - not as a vague optimism, but as God’s real work among ordinary people. New life looks like forgiveness that becomes possible again, courage to start over, gentleness where we have hardened, and a fresh desire to pray. It also looks like a church renewed: listening more deeply, welcoming more widely, and learning again how to love our neighbours as ourselves.

For some, new life will feel immediate and bright; for others it may arrive slowly, like spring in a cold year. If you are carrying grief, disappointment, or weariness, Easter does not ask you to pretend. It tells the truth: there was a cross, there was a tomb—and God was still at work. The resurrection assures us that even when we cannot yet see the way forward, God can make a way; even when we cannot yet feel joy, God can hold us; even when we are unsure what we believe, Christ remains faithful.

But Easter is never only for us; it sends us out. The first witnesses of the resurrection were entrusted with a message and a task: “Go and tell.” In the same way, the risen Christ calls us into **mission** - to share good news in words that are truthful and kind, and in actions that are practical and brave. In our community that may mean noticing the lonely, making space for the searching, standing alongside those under pressure, and serving with the compassion of Jesus.

Mission is not reserved for a few confident people; it is the shared calling of the whole church. Sometimes it looks like organised projects and public witness; sometimes it looks like quiet faithfulness: a visit, a meal, an apology, a listening ear, a lift offered, a prayer whispered at the kitchen sink. When we live this way, we become - by grace - signposts of the kingdom of God, and our neighbours catch glimpses of what God is like.

This year, the 250th anniversary year of Methodism’s presence in Horsham, I invite us to let Easter shape our daily discipleship through **The Methodist Way of Life** - a simple pattern of living the gospel together. It is not another programme to complete, but a way of life - a way of responding to Jesus with our whole lives.

John Wesley often spoke of God’s grace going before us, meeting us, and carrying us onward. The Methodist Way of Life helps us pay attention to that grace and respond in the rhythms of everyday life - so that our faith becomes not only something we hold, but a life we practise. It draws us into what Methodists have long called ‘holiness’: not cold perfection, but hearts warmed by love for God and neighbour. The Methodist way of life speaks of:

- **Worship:** We gather and we scatter in the name of the risen Lord, offering God our praise and receiving grace for the week ahead.
- **Learning and caring:** We grow as disciples through study of Scripture, prayer, conversation, and mutual support - making room for questions as well as convictions.
- **Service:** We follow Jesus by loving our neighbour in practical ways, especially where people are overlooked or burdened.
- **Evangelism:** We share faith naturally and respectfully inviting others to encounter Jesus and to find a home in the family of our church.

These practices are how resurrection takes root among us: worship that lifts our eyes, learning that renews our minds, care that binds up the broken, service that blesses the community, and evangelism that joyfully points beyond ourselves to Christ. New life grows when we keep showing up - making time for God, making room for one another, and making ourselves available to be sent.

The Church keeps celebrating Easter for fifty days, right through to Pentecost, strengthen our fellowship, to widen our compassion and to give us courage to speak of our faith in ways that are both meaningful and relatable. If you are reading this and you haven't been to church for a while, please hear this gentle invitation: you are welcome, you are missed, and there is a place for you among us.

As we move through the Easter season, could you choose one small, faithful step in each area of the Methodist way of Life?

- **Worship:** commit to being present on Sundays where you can and come expecting God to meet you.
- **Learning and caring:** join a homegroup or a study group, or simply arrange to read the bible with a friend and crucially talk about it, and about your faith. So we can grow spiritually.
- **Service:** Come and do something at church, or in the wider community, offer an hour to something that is going on in one of our buildings, check in on someone who you haven't seen for a while, someone who may be struggling, or offer your support to an appeal.
- **Evangelism:** Can I challenge each of us to pray for one person by name, and when the time is right, go visit, have a conversation, and maybe even invite them to come to a service or other church event. So that we can grow numerically. And when in church stay with the person and help them feel "at home".

My prayer is that this Easter the Holy Spirit will breathe fresh life into us, and through us into our church and neighbourhood. May we be a people of resurrection: quick to repent, ready to forgive, eager to serve, and unafraid to speak of the hope we have in the resurrected Jesus who is ever present with us.

I wish you all a very happy and blessed Easter,

Part 3

1900 – 1939

The twentieth century saw continued growth and expansion of Methodism in the villages around Horsham.

On February 12th 1903 a Trustees meeting was held at London Road:

“to consider the building of a chapel and schoolroom at Partridge Green, schoolrooms at Capel and Mannings Heath, and to devise a means for raising the money for these buildings and also for the cost of repairs at Shipley, and the purchase monies of the Partridge Green site and Faygate Chapel. Messrs Wallis and Coleman were also requested to consider securing a suitable house for a minister’s residence.”

What a meeting that must have been!

By February 23rd a suitable design, the Grafton, had been selected for Partridge Green and building estimates obtained. At the same time the Trustees had purchased for £425 the 2 cottages next to the church in London Road (where the car park is now) and decided to advertise in the Methodist Recorder for a loan at 3%.

Meanwhile new activities were starting at London Road.

The Wesley Guild was a very popular organisation. The members enjoyed a wide variety of interesting talks as well as lantern slide lectures and outings. The Wesley Guild Orchestra was started in 1897 and attracted musicians from around the town.

In 1923 a gymnastics club was started which met on 2 nights a week. There were separate classes for girls and boys. The hockey club was very popular and also met twice weekly. Other activities such as youth clubs where table tennis and billiards were played, choir practice, rehearsals for concerts and Sunday school outings all ensured that every evening offered some type of social activity.

London Road premises have had a long history of involvement with education. This started in 1904 when the Horsham Teachers Centre was set up in the former Wesley Hall. (now the lounge and small rooms at the back of the church.) As well as training girls to become teachers, it also attracted girls who wished to continue their education. This was the beginning of Horsham High School for Girls, which continued to be based here until Tanbridge House was purchased in 1924.

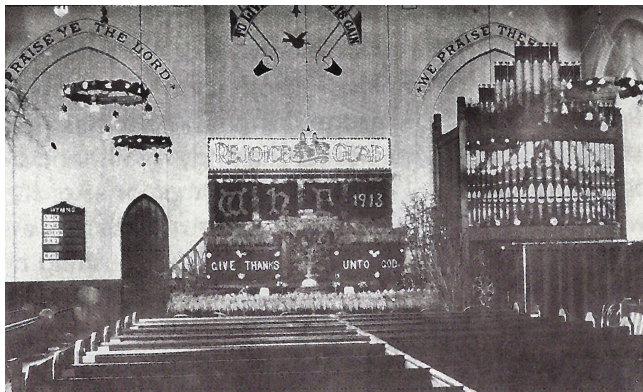
In April 1932 the church celebrated 100 years of worship at London Road. A Centenary booklet was published which gives a lively picture of the church at that time. The minister was Revd Frank Chamberlain and he summed up the centenary year as follows:

“Have we maintained the honour of our tradition? A brief survey: Church membership 180 ; Average evening congregation 250; Wesley Guild 90; Boys and girls clubs 65; boys and girls gymnasium 50; Sunday school scholars 110; Junior Guild 70; Hockey Club 50. The church is actively alive every day of the week ; there is a keen choir and NO DEBT”

Three years later, In 1935 The Methodist Recorder published an article on Church Life in Horsham. The following is an extract:

“London Road is a strong church for a town like Horsham. The congregation, which numbers every Sunday about 350 different persons for 2 services, is somewhat cosmopolitan, comprising old Methodist families and incoming Scottish Presbyterians, Anglicans, Baptists and others who appreciate the Methodist setting of religious truth and the Methodist Fellowship.....The spirit of the Church pervades the Town, a leaven of the Kingdom working in the community.”

Sunday School anniversaries and Harvest Festivals were great events. At Harvest time the church was completely decorated. A large text was displayed over the pulpit, and even the pillars under the gallery were covered with flowers and greenery.



On Sundays Local preachers went to preach in the surrounding village chapels, travelling by bicycle or bus. When one was returning from Mannings Heath to Horsham on Sunday 3rd September he heard a siren sounding and was told by passengers on the bus that war had been declared.

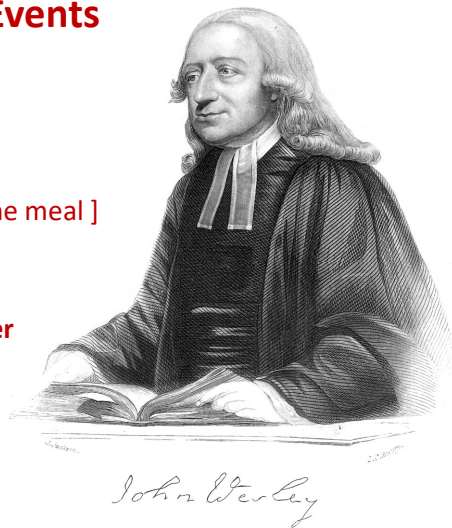

The Leprosy Mission Up-date



The Leprosy Mission reported a little while ago that “God has led us to a new and forgotten region of India, Odisha State”. He has shown us communities in desperate need where people have been abandoned. Here they endure the worst living conditions imaginable. Unsafe housing and unclean water mean disease is rife. Bodies are frail and malnourished.

The people living in these communities share a common link – leprosy. Many are unceremoniously dumped here after being cast out of family life. Heartbroken, they are robbed of all dignity and hope, feared and despised by the outside world.

But we know these people are special and precious to Jesus. They are the very people He taught us to love and reach out to in the Gospels.

Most people living in the leprosy colonies of Odisha rely on begging for survival. There are no safe homes to return to when the sun’s scorching heat or monsoon rains become unbearable. Broken asbestos roofs barely cover shacks with decayed windows and doors. Children face constant sickness from drinking river water. It’s impossible to stay clean. And no toilets mean walking into fields, fearful of cobras at night.

The people have been abandoned for a quarter of a century. In 1999 a missionary from Australia and his two young sons were burned to death in Odisha. Their crime was sharing the hope of Jesus with these people. Since then, they have been entirely forgotten by the world.

Like you we believe Jesus is the hope of the nations. And together, in His name we can revive these communities and restore hope. Stopping the spread of leprosy, now and for future generations. Providing clean water and toilets. Building safe homes. Providing opportunities to grow food and look after livestock. With your support people affected by leprosy in Odisha will no longer be abandoned.

Pastor Elisha, also a long-time sufferer of leprosy living in a neighbouring state has been leading the team ministering to these leprosy colonies in Odisha. Now in his late sixties he recently handed over to a new lead, Victor. In the last year gardens have been started producing fresh food and fruit trees have been planted. An agreement with the Indian Government means that new housing is being built in the colonies and arrangements with the local health authorities is providing health care.

Victor writes “Praise Jesus for His provision for leprosy colonies in Odisha! Give thanks for the transformation we are bringing together, and for good relationships with local government. please pray for the wellbeing for our team and the people we serve, and protection as we travel to remote communities.

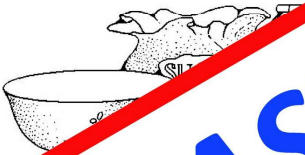

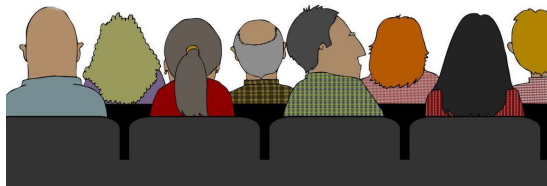
What to do next

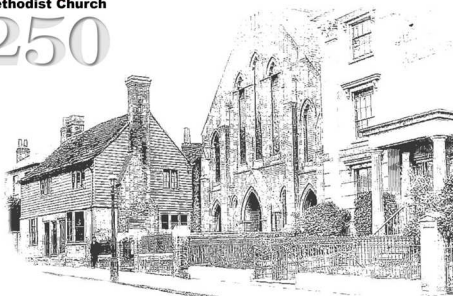

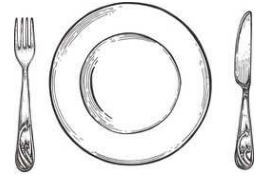

STATEMENT

The World Council of Churches, Middle East Council of Churches, Lutheran World Federation, World Communion of Reformed Churches, World Methodist Council, Mennonite World Conference, Christian Conference of Asia, and ACT Alliance join in expressing their deep concern regarding the humanitarian and social impacts of the widening conflict in the Middle East, and the threat it poses to the peace and security of the region and the world.

Having endured many years of complex political, economic and social challenges, the people of Iran—numbering more than 92 million—now face the immediate threats of the current conflict, and a very uncertain future

The use of force by the United States and Israel against Iran, the killing of Iranian Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei on 28 February, and Iran’s subsequent retaliation, have resulted in a war that threatens peace across the region and beyond. It also raises serious concerns regarding the safety and well-being of civilians, a tragic example of which is the reported deaths of as many as 175 schoolgirls and staff in a missile strike on a girls’ school in the southern Iranian city of Minab.

The humanitarian risks and suffering will inevitably escalate the longer this conflict continues. Moreover, we are gravely concerned by the increasing reports indicating serious violations of international humanitarian law during the ongoing military operations. We insist that as a matter of moral and legal obligation all conflict participants must protect civilians from harm, and refrain from targeting civilian areas and infrastructure.

Moreover, we fear that the conflict may result in a new period of prolonged violence and instability in the wider region. It is already engulfing many countries in the region and beyond. In Lebanon, the situation has escalated into a full-scale Israeli attack affecting multiple regions of the country, including the capital, Beirut. Extensive destruction has been inflicted on residential neighbourhoods in Lebanon, especially in the southern suburbs of Beirut and large areas of southern Lebanon. The intensification of hostilities has resulted in widespread civilian suffering and has forced hundreds of thousands of people to flee their homes in search of safety. Iraq too has been affected by the regional escalation, with growing tensions and security concerns adding further strain to an already fragile context. Iranian retaliatory strikes have also impacted several Gulf countries, as well as Cyprus and Azerbaijan.

Further, we are deeply concerned that these attacks and their consequences will likely cause even larger population displacements in a region with an already very high number of displaced people, and with woefully inadequate provision or planning to ensure the welfare of IDPs within Iran or refugees in neighbouring countries.

In addition to the immediate consequences of death, destruction and displacement in Iran and the most affected countries, this conflict is already now impacting the lives and livelihoods of people, communities and societies in the whole region. Along with the rest of society in Iran and the wider region, churches and Christian communities face the dangers this war poses for their future.

It must be emphasized that the joint Israeli and US attacks are clearly illegal under international law. They are conducted without any credible substantiation of the alleged imminent threat from Iran, and are in flagrant violation of the UN Charter which was created precisely to save the world's people from the scourge of war. The abandonment of diplomacy in favour of armed attack is reckless and irresponsible.

Having taken this path, Israel and the United States of America must not be permitted to once again create a desolation and call it peace. They must take responsibility for the consequences of their actions, including the consequences for the future of the people of Iran whose freedom they claim to promote.

We appeal for an immediate ceasefire, for the urgent resumption of diplomatic engagement and political dialogue through established international and regional mechanisms, and for full compliance by all States with their obligations under international law, including the UN Charter.

Our appeal is grounded in our faith and our Christian ethical values, as well as in law and policy. We affirm that war is incompatible with God's very nature and will for humanity, and against our fundamental Christian principles. Peace is a moral and spiritual imperative rooted in our faith in a God of justice and compassion, and a gift not achieved through force or strength of arms. Human dignity is sacred, reflecting the image of God. Any assault on civilian life or systematic violation of human rights, whether through external attack or internal oppression, is a direct affront to God-given human dignity and the sanctity of life.

In this conflict and in our wider global context, we lament the absence of morality and legality, the prevailing arrogance and ideologies of power, and the replacement of conscience with political utility. As Christians, we do not recognize any divine licence to kill, destroy, displace or occupy. We proclaim the God-given human dignity and rights of all people, equally and without discrimination. We reject the brutal logic of war and domination. We seek the gift of peace.

We pray for the people of the Middle East who have suffered too much violence for too long, and too often as the result of interventions by external actors. We invite all churches and Christians of the world, and all people of faith and good will, to join in praying for peace in the Middle East, and everywhere in our world where there is conflict and strife.

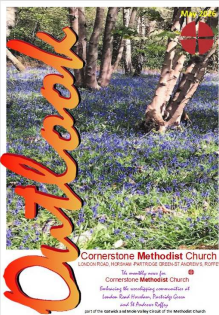
